

Many weather-related disasters can strike without warning, causing devastating damage to businesses, homes, and critical personal documents. #### - Safeguard Your Important Documents -

Store original documents (such as tax returns, birth certificates, deeds, titles, and insurance policies) inside waterproof containers in a secure space. Keep duplicates of these documents with a trusted person in another location. Scanning them for backup storage on electronic media, such as a cloud storage service.

#### **Document Your Belongings -**

Current photos or videos of the contents of your home and business can help support claims for insurance or tax benefits after a disaster. All property, especially expensive and high-value items, should be recorded.





# Ensure Payroll Protection -

For business owners, if your business uses a payroll service provider, ask if it has a fiduciary bond in place. This bond could protect you in the event of default by the payroll service provider.

# - Accessing Tax Relief After a Disaster

When FEMA issues a disaster declaration, the IRS may postpone tax-filing and payment deadlines for affected taxpayers. There's typically no need to request relief; the IRS automatically identifies and applies relief for those in the disaster area. If you have been impacted by a disaster and have tax-related questions, you can contact the IRS at <u>866-562-5227</u> to speak with an IRS specialist trained to handle disaster-related issues. If you do not reside in a covered disaster area, but suffered impact from a disaster, call <u>866-562-5227</u> to find out if you qualify for disaster tax relief and to discuss other available options.
